

We sent Ya'ax and his classmates some messages and photos to introduce ourselves.




Ya'ax created a tour of his school with him as our guide! His teacher Marie Gill emailed the video to us.

"I'm now going to take you into my class...This is the schedule in my class."






This is our plant we've been growing for six weeks!"






Ya'ax's classmates taught us to count in Swahili!






















We also made African animal masks!


